II. SB 1033 – BUTTE COUNTY (ACTION IF NECESSARY)

In 1993, the Commission assumed a new duty to review county applications for findings of significant financial distress. The Commission is required to review county applications that include program and financial reports, conduct at least two public hearings on the matter, and determine if the applicant county is facing significant financial distress within 90 days of receiving the application. An affirmative finding by the Commission permits the county to reduce general assistance benefits for up to three years.

County applications are complex because they include budgets, budget forecasts, descriptions of county efforts to constrain expenditures, information on flexibility in spending and resources, debt and cash flow, and unmet budget needs, i.e., the programs or services a county cannot provide because of inadequate resources.

Commission regulations authorize the Chairperson to assign this application to a hearing panel consisting of one or more members of the Commission, which shall act on behalf of the Commission, or to a hearing officer for hearing and preparation of a preliminary decision. If an assignment is not made, then the application will be set for hearing before the Commission itself.

Butte County filed its SB 1033 application on February 10, 2005. The Commission requested additional funding to review and hear this application. On March 14, 2005, the Joint Legislative Budget Committee approved the Department of Finance's request to approve a budget augmentation for this program.

Shirley Opie, former Assistant Executive Director will return to the Commission as a retired annuitant and manage the SB 1033 process. There are strict timelines that must be followed under this statutory scheme. The Department of Finance's Office of State Audits and Evaluation (OSAE) will review the County's application, prepare the fiscal and program analysis, and assist the Commission members when they travel to Oroville for this hearing. Commission members will be contacted directly to set the hearing dates for the evidentiary hearing in Oroville, and the hearing for adoption of the statement of decision. For informational purposes only, a copy of the Commission's decision on Butte County's last application is included as Exhibit A.

No further action is necessary at this time unless the Commission members would like the Chairperson to assign the application to a hearing panel or hearing officer for the evidentiary hearing in Oroville and preparation of the preliminary statement of decision.

III. 2005-2006 BUDGET

A. Commission Budget - Item 8885

The Governor's Budget proposes \$1.629 million for the Commission on State Mandates. This includes an augmentation of \$427,000 to reduce the test claim backlog. If approved, the Commission would add three limited-term positions and one permanent position. Budget hearings have been scheduled, as follows:

B. Legislative Analyst's Report

The 2005-06 Budget: Perspectives and Issues

In Part IV: Perspectives on State Expenditures, the Legislative Analyst (LAO) addresses "Estimated State Mandate Liabilities as of End of 2005-06" and "Major Mandate Budget Proposals."

Through the end of 2004-05, LAO estimates that the state will owe about \$2.8 billion:

- About \$2.2 billion for unpaid claims from 2003-04 and earlier years.
- Over \$500 million for unpaid claims in 2004-05.
- About \$100 million for new mandates identified by the Commission.

The LAO identifies the following issues for legislative consideration:

- Mandate costs for local agencies are reduced by \$250 million (\$210 million for one-time mandate suspensions, \$31 million of cost deferral of the *Peace Officers Bill of Rights*, and \$14 million due to ongoing savings from *Open Meeting Act* mandate).
- Additional mandate costs are pushed into the future: no funding for K-14 mandates and insufficient funding for local agency 2005-06 mandates.
- Proposed constitutional amendment (ACA 4) would amend article XIII B, section 6 of the California Constitution to authorize the state to pay claims for costs incurred by local agencies prior to the 2004-05 fiscal year over a term of 15 years. (Current law specifies that the payment term will be five years, beginning in 2006-07.)

Analysis of the 2005-2006 Budget Bill

On February 24, 2005, the Legislative Analyst's Office (LAO) issued the 2005 Budget Analysis. The LAO makes recommendations on newly identified mandates and mandates that are included in the Governor's proposed budget. Commission staff may be requested to attend budget hearings for other departments or items if there are mandate-related recommendations being discussed. III. REPORTS TO THE LEGISLATURE

A. Reporting Statements of Decision to the Legislature

Pursuant to AB 2856 of 2004, Commission staff is now forwarding adopted statements of decision to the Legislature within 30 days of adoption.

B. Reporting Statewide Cost Estimates to the Legislature

Commission staff will submit a Report to the Legislature following this hearing that reports statewide cost estimates for the *Pupil Promotion and Retention, AIDS Prevention Instruction II, Teacher Incentive Program, and Differential Pay and Reemployment* mandates. This will complete the statewide cost estimates for 2004-2005.

IV. LEGISLATION

A. Commission Sponsored Legislation

The Commission is sponsoring two bills this year:

AB 943 (Keene) would revise the SB 1033 process to allow counties to self-certify that they are in significant financial distress rather than seeking a determination from the Commission.

AB 1467 (Laird) would require mandates listed in the State Budget to also be identified by Commission test claim number. This bill will act as a placeholder for mandate reform proposals.

B. Other Mandate Bills

AB 500 (La Malfa) would reduce from \$1,000 to \$200, the threshold for filing reimbursement claims with the State Controller's Office.

ACA 1X 4 (Keene) would place on the ballot a constitutional amendment to implement the Governor's budget process proposals. This proposal includes two amendments to

article XIII B, section 6 which would: (1) clarify that a reduction in appropriation for a mandated program shall not be deemed to reduce the overall amount to which local governments are entitled; and (2) require state reimbursement to local agencies for prior year claims within 15 years instead of 5 years.

SB 190 (Cedillo) would make a technical revision to the procedures for proposing a reasonable reimbursement methodology that were adopted last year.

SCA1X 2 (McClintock) would place on the ballot a constitutional amendment to repeal article XIII B, and instead provide that no local government be required to provide any new program or higher level of service unless and until it has received a subvention of funds to reimburse them for the costs of the program or increased level of service.

C. Other Bills

AB 94 (Haynes) would require each state agency, department, board, and commission to prepare and provide a report to the Legislature on its financial activities for the

2000-2001, 2001-2002, 2002-2003, 2003-2004, and 2004-2005 fiscal years no later than January 15, 2006, and by January 15 for each subsequent fiscal year.

AB 1561 (Umberg) would declare the intent of the Legislature to implement procedures to impose penalties and/or remove from office appointed members of state boards and commissions who do not adequately perform their duties, including the regular attendance of meetings.

AB 1625 (Klehs) would require every written report submitted to the Legislature by any state agency, department, board, or commission include a signed statement by the head of that agency or chair of the board or commission declaring under penalty of perjury that the contents of the report are accurate to the best of his or her knowledge. This bill only applies to those individuals appointed by the Governor and confirmed by the Senate.
