EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Staffing, Budget, Workload Update, and Tentative Agenda Items for the July and September 2020 Meetings (info)

I. New Commission Staff

The Commission has recently hired three new Commission Counsel.

Ms. Juliana Gmur has been an attorney for 27 years, has been in public service for approximately 14 years, practicing public law while serving as a deputy county counsel I through IV and as the Assistant County Counsel (and acting as County Counsel when the County Counsel is not available), and has approximately 11 years of state mandate law experience representing local government before the Commission on State Mandates (between the years of 2002-2013). In her prior State-mandate experience representing local government, she filed test claims, proposed parameters and guidelines, and incorrect reduction claims on approximately 21 state-mandated local programs. Ms. Gmur joined us as an Attorney III on March 2, 2020 and we are delighted to have her onboard.

Mr. Christopher Becker has been an attorney for 16 years and has been in public service for approximately 15 of those years, working for the State and for the County of Sacramento. He served as a deputy district attorney for approximately four years where he had many jury trials and over 40 court trials. In his capacity as a Deputy Attorney General and as Supervising Deputy Attorney General he has supervised a team of six attorneys in numerous civil lawsuits, provided legal counsel to the Governor's Office and the Department of Corrections, conducted jury trials, prepared and argued legal briefs, and argued before the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals. Mr. Becker joined us as an Attorney IV on May 1, 2020 and is a welcome addition to the legal team.

Ms. Elizabeth McGinnis, is an attorney with eight years of civil litigation experience and demonstrated communication, legal writing, and research skills. Ms. McGinnis is a dedicated public servant, having worked for Legal Aid of Sonoma County, California Rural Legal Assistance, as well as in private practice where she represented nonprofits and governmental entities. She also spent two years as a Research Attorney III for the Shasta County Superior Court, developing skills that will certainly be applicable to her work at the Commission. Ms. McGinnis joined us as an Attorney I on May 1, 2020 thus completing our legal team.

The Commission is now fully staffed.

II. 2020-21 Budget

The Budget Act of 2020 (AB 1917, Ting; SB 808, Mitchell) was introduced on January 10, 2020. The Commission's budget, 8885, was heard in Senate Budget Subcommittee 4 on Thursday, March 12, 2020. It has yet to be scheduled for hearing in Assembly Budget Subcommittee 4 as the Legislature has been adjourned to allow for physical distancing to prevent the spread of COVID-19.

A. The Commission's Operating Budget: 8885-001-0001

The Commission's 2020-2021 budget as proposed in the Governor's Budget was \$2,781,000, which is an increase of \$206,000 over the 2019-2020 adjusted budget of \$2,575,000.

The Commission requested an augmentation of \$206,000 which includes \$102,000 in operating expenses and equipment and \$104,000 in salary for 1.5 new staff positions to perform the Commission's administrative functions of budgeting, procurement, and human resources and the significant additional requirements of the Financial Information System for California (FI\$Cal). It is our understanding that this budget change proposal will not move forward at this time because of revenue shortfalls due to the COVID-19 response.

B. Local Agency Mandate Funding and Suspension

ii. 5180-151-0001—For Local Assistance, Department of Social Services

Although local agency mandates have generally been funded through the Commission's budget in recent years, this budget makes up to 4 million dollars available in county-optional block grant funding through the Department of Social Services' budget, for allocation to local agencies to fund activities that are reimbursable under *Interagency Child Abuse and Neglect Investigation Reports*, 00-TC-22. Local governments that receive the block grant funding are not eligible to claim costs under section 17560 of the Government Code for any costs associated with the program. The Department of Social Services, in consultation with the California State Association of Counties, shall develop the allocation methodology for distributing the funds to the participating counties.

C. K-14 Mandate Funding and Suspension

Unlike local agency mandate funding, K-14 mandate funding takes place outside of the Commission's budget. Among other things, the Budget Bill (AB 1917, Ting; SB 808 Mitchell) does the following with regard to mandate funding.

- 1. The funds appropriated in this item are for transfer by the Controller to Section B of the State School Fund. Pursuant to Section 17581.7 of the Government Code, the funds appropriated in this item shall be distributed to community college districts that elect to participate in the block grant on the basis of funded full-time equivalent students (FTES) calculated as of the second principal apportionment for the 2019–20 fiscal year multiplied by \$30.85 per FTES; and
- 2. If total funding provided in this item is insufficient to fully fund the rate specified in Provision 1, the Chancellor of the California Community Colleges shall proportionately reduce the rate to conform to available funding.

C. ADMINISTATIVE WORKLOAD (info)

This section of the Executive Director's Report highlights major issues, challenges, and achievements with regard to the administrative workload of Commission staff.
