CALL TO ORDER AND ROLL CALL

The Commission met in open session via Zoom under authority extended by Executive Order N-1-22. Chairperson Miller called the meeting to order at 10:03 a.m. Executive Director Heather Halsey called the roll. Members Adams, Kuffel, Miller, Nash, Olsen, Stowers, and Walker all indicated that they were present.

The claimant did not contact the Commission staff 22 23 to indicate whether or not they would be attending this hearing. 24 25 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Good morning, Ms. Gmur. Nice 18

1 to see you.

2 MS. GMUR: Good morning, Madam Chair,3 Commissioners.

This incorrect reduction claim challenges the State Controller's reduction of reimbursement claims filed by the City of Arcadia for the Municipal Storm Water and Urban Runoff Discharges Program for fiscal years 2002 to 2003 through 2008 to 2009.

9 The Controller found that the claimant failed to 10 identify and deduct, as offsetting revenues, Proposition 11 A, local return funds, which the claimant received from 12 the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation 13 Authority and used to pay for the reimbursable 14 activities.

Staff finds that the Controller's reduction is
correct, as a matter of law. Under Article XIII B,
Section 6, of the California Constitution, the State is
required to provide reimbursement only when a local
government is mandated by the State to spend its own
proceeds of taxes, subject to the appropriations limit
of Article XIII B.

Proposition A is a transactions and use tax levied by the Transportation Authority, a portion of which is distributed to cities for use on eligible transportation projects. These taxes, however, are not levied by or

19

1	for the cities. Thus, they are not the claimant's local
2	proceeds of taxes not eligible for reimbursement, and
3	the funds must be identified as offsetting revenues
4	against its reimbursement claims.
5	Accordingly, staff recommends that the Commission
6	deny the IRC and authorize staff to make any technical,
7	nonsubstantive changes to the proposed decision
8	following this hearing.

4	MS. MAGEE: Good morning. The following are the
5	legislative updates since the last time the Commission
6	met:
7	First, AB 1610, State mandates: claims, which
8	proposed to reduce the statutorily required minimum
9	amount of costs incurred to file the mandate
10	reimbursement claim from \$1,000 to \$800 was introduced
11	by Assemblymember Lackey on January 5th, 2022, and was
12	referred to the Assembly Committee on Local Government
13	on January 14th.
14	This bill contains similar language to the member's
15	2020 and 2021 spot bills, which staff tracked
16	previously.
17	According to the author's office, they will not be
18	moving forward with this bill.
19	Next, AB 1967, State government. Existing law sets
20	forth the sole procedure by which local agencies and
21	school districts may claim reimbursement for costs
22	mandated by the State. This bill would make technical,
23	nonsubstantive changes to those provisions, and was
24	introduced by Assemblymember Daly on February 10th,
25	2022.
	24

1	According to the author's office, this is not a
2	spot bill and will be amended.
3	Next, AB 1733, State bodies: open meetings.
4	As was detailed in the legislative update for
5	today's agenda, this bill makes changes to the
6	Bagley-Keene Open Meeting Act. This bill was introduced
7	by Assemblymember Quirk on January 31st, 2022, and was
8	referred to the Assembly Committees on Governmental
9	Organization, and Business and Professions on
10	February 18th.
11	Next, AB 1795, Open meetings: remote participation.
12	This bill would require state bodies to provide all
13	persons the ability to participate both in person and
14	remotely in any meeting and to address the body
15	remotely.
16	This bill was introduced by Assemblymember Fong on
17	February 7th, 2022, and was referred to the Assembly
18	Committee on Governmental Organization on February 18th.
19	Next, AB 2066, Communication: telegraph
20	corporations, telegraphy, and telegrams. This bill
21	makes changes to telegraph laws not relevant to the
22	Commission. This bill would also amend the provisions
23	for special meetings, under Bagley-Keene, by removing
24	the telegram as a means for a member to waive notice.
25	This bill was introduced by Member Seyarto on
	25

1	February 14th, 2022; was referred to the Assembly
2	Committee on Communications and Conveyance on
3	February 24th; was corrected on February 25th; and was
4	set for hearing on March 23rd.
5	Additionally, the following four bills that
6	Commission staff monitored last year died pursuant to
7	Article IV, Section 10(c), of the Constitution, because
8	they did not make it out of their house of origin by
9	January 31st, 2022: AB 1013, State Mandates, claims;
10	AB 885, Bagley-Keene Open Meeting Act: teleconferencing;
11	AB 29, State bodies: meetings; and, finally, AB 883,
12	State agencies: audits.
13	Staff will continue to monitor legislation for
14	bills that impact the mandates process.
15	Thank you.
16	CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Great. Thank you so much for
17	that thorough report.
18	Any questions from the board?
19	MEMBER OLSEN: This seems to be the day I have all
20	sorts of questions.
21	CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Good. I love it.

7	these. And without exceptions, folks have plans to go
8	back in person in April. So I think it's it is
9	entirely up to the fate of the legislation. Of course,

11	about hybrid, as long as you are in a public location.
12	So to the extent that there's any legislation that
13	anyone is particularly interested in, it is certainly
14	worthwhile to reach out to legislators and let them
15	know.
16	And I know, especially Ms. Olsen and Mr. Adams, you
17	deal with a lot of this as well. So it's something
18	we're all interested in seeing the outcome of.

And then on inactive status, pending the outcome of 22 23 litigation, that's pending in the Third, there's one 24 parameters and quidelines regarding storm water. 25 And, finally, we have eight -- eight -- sorry. 30

1	Four IRCs remaining pending.
2	Commission staff currently expects to complete all
3	of the current pending test claims and IRCs by
4	approximately the January 24th, 2025, meeting, depending
5	on staffing and other workload.
6	For tentative agenda items, you can always refer to
7	the Executive Director's report from each hearing, and
8	it lists the items that we expect are most likely to be
9	heard in the next two hearings. And then we also have
10	reports on our website under "Pending Caseload." And
11	you can see all matters that have been filed with the
12	Commission and when they are currently tentatively set
13	if you want to get an idea of the long-term planning for
14	when thing will be heard.
