

3	Elizabeth McGinnis will present a proposed decision on
4	an incorrect reduction claim on Municipal Stormwater and
5	Urban Runoff Discharges.
6	At this time, we invite the parties and witnesses
7	for Item 4 to please come to the table.
8	MS. McGINNIS: Hi. Good morning. It's nice to see
9	everybody in person. This is my first time doing a
10	Commission hearing in person, so it's pretty exciting.
11	This incorrect reduction claim alleges that the
12	State Controller's Office incorrectly reduced
13	reimbursement claims filed by the City of La Puente for
14	costs arising from the Municipal Stormwater and Urban
15	Runoff Discharges Program.
16	The Controller found that the claimant failed to
17	identify and deduct as offsetting revenues Proposition
18	A, Local Return Funds, which the claimant received from
19	the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation
20	Authority, and used to pay for the installation and
21	maintenance of trash receptacles at transit stops
22	required by the mandated program.
23	Staff finds that the Controller's reduction is
24	correct as a matter of law. Under Article XIII B
25	section 6, of the California Constitution, the State is

required to provide reimbursement only when a local
government is mandated to spend its own proceeds of
taxes subject to the appropriations limit of Article
XIII B.

5 Proposition A is a transactions and use tax levied 6 by the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation 7 Authority. A portion of those tax revenues are 8 distributed to the claimant through the Proposition A 9 Local Return Program for use on eligible transportation 10 projects.

11 The tax, however, is not levied by or for the 12 claimant, as that constitutional phrase is interpreted 13 by the courts, because the claimant does not have the 14 authority to levy the Proposition A tax. Therefore, the 15 tax is not the claimant's local proceeds of taxes, nor 16 are the proceeds subject to the claimant's 17 appropriations limit.

18 Therefore, whereas here, a local government funds 19 mandated activities with other than its own proceeds of 20 taxes, those amounts are not eligible for reimbursement, 21 and the funds must be identified as offsetting revenues 22 against its reimbursement claims.

Accordingly, staff recommends that the Commissionadopt the proposed decision and deny this IRC.

17	since the last Commission meeting:
18	First, AB 1610, State mandates: claims: This bill
19	proposed to reduce the minimum amount of costs incurred
20	to file amended reimbursement claims from \$1,000 to
21	\$800. It was introduced by Assembly Member Lackey on
22	January 5th and was referred to the Assembly Committee
23	on Local Government on January 14th. This bill contains
24	similar language to the member's 2020 and 2021 spot
25	bills, which staff tracked previously. According to the
	16

1	author's office, they will not be moving forward with
2	this bill.
3	Next, AB 1967, State government, was originally
4	proposed to amend Government Code section 17552 relating
5	to State government and the provisions of claim
6	reimbursement for costs mandated by the State. However,
7	this bill has been retitled and also revised to amend a
8	different and unrelated Government Code section,
9	65589.5, pertaining to housing. Commission staff will
10	no longer be tracking this bill.
11	Next, AB 1733, State bodies: open meetings. As was
12	detailed in the Legislative Update for today's agenda,
13	this bill makes changes to the Bagley-Keene Open Meeting
14	Act. It was introduced by Member Quirk on
15	January 31st and was referred to the Assembly Committees
16	on Governmental Organizational and Business and
17	Professions on February 18th. The hearing for this
18	bill, scheduled for April 20th, was postponed.
19	According to staff from the Committee on
20	Governmental Organization, this bill was pulled from the
21	hearing by the committee, and there's no information on
22	whether or when it might be heard in the future.
23	Next, Open next, AB 1795, Open meetings: Remote
24	participation. This bill would require State bodies to
25	provide all persons the ability to participate both
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1	in-person and remotely in any meeting and to address the
2	body remotely. It was introduced by Assemblymember Fong
3	on February 7th. And on February 18th, it was referred
4	to the Assembly Committee on Governmental Organization,
5	where no action has been taken on it since.
6	Finally, AB 2066, Communication: telegraph
7	corporations, telegraphy, and telegrams. I believe this
8	is Member Adams's favorite bill. This bill makes
9	changes to telegraph laws not relevant to the
10	Commission, but also amends the provision for special
11	meetings under Bagley-Keene by removing the telegram as
12	a means for members to waive notice.
13	This bill was introduced by Member Seyarto on
14	February 14th; was referred to the Assembly Committee on
15	Communications and Conveyance on February 24th; and was
16	corrected on February 25th.
17	On March 23rd, the bill passed as amended on
18	consent and was re-referred to the Assembly Committee on
19	Appropriations; on March 28th, it was amended; and on
20	March 29th, re-referred to the Assembly Committee on
21	Appropriations.
22	Staff will continue to monitor legislations for
23	bills that affect the mandates process.
24	That's all I have.
25	MS. HALSEY: Thank you, Heidi.

1	Does anyone have any questions?
2	CHAIRPERSON BOSLER: No. But thank you for the
3	update.
4	Anyone? Any questions from the Commission?
5	(No response.)
6	MS. HALSEY: And Senior Commission Counsel
7	Elizabeth McGinnis will present Item 8, the Chief Legal
8	Counsel Report.
9	MS. McGINNIS: Okay. There have been no new
10	filings since the Commission's last hearing.
11	And we have a recent decision for the City of San
12	Diego v. Commission on State Mandates case. That's the
13	lead sampling in schools case.
14	On April 29th this year, the Third District Court
15	of Appeal issued an unpublished decision, and that
16	decision reversed the Commission's decision, finding
17	that the permit imposes a new program or a higher level
18	of service.
19	As far as the litigation calendar is concerned,
20	since the agenda was issued, the California Supreme
21	Court set oral argument in the Coast Community College
22	District case. That's the minimum conditions case. And
23	that's scheduled for Wednesday, June 8th, at 9:00 a.m.
24	And that's all I have.
25	MS. PALCHIK: May I just add, Ms. Halsey, before

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1	you go on to your report, I believe we skipped over
2	Item 5.
3	MS. HALSEY: Item 5 is reserved for county
4	applications for a finding of significant financial
5	distress, or SB 1033 applications. No SB 1033
6	applications have been filed.
7	Item 9 is the Executive Director's Report.
8	First, I have some good news on behalf of the
9	Commission. The Commission has recently hired a new
10	Senior Counsel, Ms. Mariko Kotani. Ms. Kotani graduated
11	from Stanford with a Bachelor of Arts in Sociology and
12	Japanese, and then went on to graduate from Santa Clara
13	Law School, summa cum laude.
14	After several public interest legal intern
15	experiences, she began her legal career at the Office of
16	Legislative Counsel, first as a summer intern, then as a
17	graduate legal assistant, and then as deputy legislative
18	counsel, where she drafted complex legislation and
19	prepared legal memoranda on a wide variety of subjects,
20	with a particular focus on tax and cannabis law.
21	Ms. Kotani comes to the Commission from a stint at
22	the Department of Consumer Affairs, where she drafted
23	regulatory packages for various boards and bureaus. And
24	Ms. Kotani has experience presenting before boards,
25	bureaus, and the legislature, and has a general
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1	familiarity of mandates law due to her experience
2	drafting bills and analyzing their impacts on local
3	governments.
4	Ms. Kotani joined the Commission on May 2nd, 2022,
5	and we are delighted to have her on board. And now the
6	Commission is fully staffed.
7	CHAIRPERSON BOSLER: That's wonderful news. Thank
8	you.
9	MS. HALSEY: And then on the budget, we have the
10	Budget Subcommittees 4 on both the Assembly and the
11	Senate. Our budget was heard and it was approved as
12	proposed.
13	The governor has also released his May revision to
14	the budget on May 13th, which included an additional
15	appropriation to the vote-by-mail ballots, prepaid
16	postage, at the high end of the range of the statewide
17	cost estimate that was adopted by the Commission this
18	January.
19	And, finally, for our workload, after this hearing,
20	we have 40 pending test claims, 37 of which are
21	regarding stornwater NPDES permits. There's also one
22	amendment to the parameters and guidelines and three
23	statewide cost estimates pending.
24	On inactive status, pending outcome of litigation,
25	there's one parameters and guidelines regarding
	21

1 stormwater.

And, finally, there are three IRCs, or incorrectreduction claims, pending.

4 Commission staff currently expects to complete all 5 of the current pending test claims and IRCs by 6 approximately the December of 2025 hearing, depending on 7 staffing and other workload. However, some of these 8 pending test claims may be heard and decided earlier 9 than currently indicated if they are consolidated for a 10 hearing.

Finally, if you are interested in commenting or seeing when your item is going to be scheduled, looking at the Executive Director's Report, you can get an idea of the matters that should be set for the next couple of hearings.

And then also on our website, we have a pending caseload where we list all matters that are currently pending before the Commission and the dates on which we tentatively expect them to be heard.

20 That's all I have.

21 CHAIRPERSON BOSLER: Thank you.

22 Anyone have any comments from the Commission?

23 Questions for Heather?

24 (No response.)

HALSEY: Very good news. 5 CHAIRPERSON BOSLER: Are we ready to move to closed 6 executive session? 7 The Commission will meet in closed executive 8 session pursuant to Government Code section 11126(e) to confer with and receive advice from legal counsel for 9 10 consideration and action, as necessary and appropriate, 11 upon the pending litigation listed on the published 12 notice and agenda; and to confer with and receive advice 13 from legal counsel regarding potential litigation. The Commission will also confer on personnel 14 15 matters pursuant to Government Code section 11126(a)(1). 16 We now ask that the public exit the meeting room 17 for closed executive session and reenter when the 18 Commission reconvenes in open session in approximately 19 15 minutes. 20 Thank you. 21 (Closed session was held from 22 10:24 a.m. to 10:42 a.m.) 23 CHAIRPERSON BOSLER: Welcome back. 24 The Commission met in closed executive session 25 pursuant to Government Code section 11126(e) to confer 23

1	with and receive advice from legal counsel for
2	consideration and action, as necessary and appropriate,
3	upon the pending litigation listed on the published
4	notice and agenda; and to confer with and receive advice
5	from legal counsel regarding potential litigation.
6	The Commission also conferred on personnel matters.
7	With no further business to discuss, I will
8	entertain a motion to adjourn.
9	MEMBER WALKER: So moved.
10	CHAIRPERSON BOSLER: So moved.
11	Is there a second?
12	MEMBER OPPENHEIM: Second.
13	CHAIRPERSON BOSLER: It's been moved and seconded.
14	Please Heather, please call the roll.
15	MS. HALSEY: Mr. Adams.
16	MEMBER ADAMS: Aye.
17	MS. HALSEY: Ms. Bosler.
18	CHAIRPERSON BOSLER: Aye.
19	MS. HALSEY: Ms. Nash.
20	MEMBER NASH: Aye.
21	MS. HALSEY: Mr. Oppenheim.
22	MEMBER OPPENHEIM: Aye.
23	MS. HALSEY: Mr. Walker.
24	MEMBER WALKER: Aye.
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1	CHAIRPERSON BOSLER: The motion has carried.
2	The meeting is adjourned. Thank you, everyone, for
3	attending today.
