MCGINNIS: Good morning. 15 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Good morning. 16 MS. MCGINNIS: This testing claim involves a statute 17 that requires law enforcement agencies to perform specified 18 activities within set timeframes to insure the DNA testing 19 of all sexual assault forensic evidence received by the law 20 enforcement agency on or after January 1st, 2016. 21 Staff finds that the test claims statute imposes a 22 reimbursable state-mandated decide program on county and 23 city law enforcement agencies in whose jurisdiction the sex 24 offenses have occurred with activities listed in the

25

proposed decision.

1 Staff also finds that conducting follow-up 2 investigations on evidence tested pursuant to the test claim 3 statute is not a reimbursable state-mandated activity. 4 Accordingly, staff recommends that the Commission adopt 5 the proposed decision to partially approve this test claim 6 and authorize staff to make any technical, nonsubstantive 7 changes following the hearing. 8 Thank you. 9 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Thank you, Ms. McGinnis. 10 We will now -- if the parties and witnesses could 11 please state your name for the record. And we will 12 begin with -- who should we begin with, Ms. Halsey, for this 13 item? 14 MS. HALSEY: Department of finance, Ms. Thompson. 15 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Thank you. 16 MS. Anyone else wishing to 5 comment for any reason? 6 MS. PALCHIK: I see no public comment. 7 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Thank you, Ms. Palchik. 8 Does any -- do the board members have any questions? 9 MEMBER WONG-HERNANDEZ: Madam Chair --10 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Ms. Wong-Hernandez, please. 11 MEMBER WONG-HERNANDEZ: I have a question. 12 So the claimant deciding not to participate in the hearing, does that mean that they ultimately sort of concur 13 14 that the -- the subsequent investigations that they were claiming would arise specifically from the mandate are, in 15 16 fact, not reimbursable? Is that what I'm supposed to infer? 17 Or they -- they don't want to argue with you all about it? 18 MS. HALSEY: It's -- they didn't indicate either way. 19 They just are not participating. It could be for a variety 20 of reasons, and they haven't let us know what those reasons 21 are. 22 MEMBER WONG-HERNANDEZ: Okay. I was hoping to ask them 23 a couple questions about that. And so, I guess, I want to 24 just state then, for the record, instead of asking the 25 question, that I -- I definitely agree with your position on that. And I -- I was very disappointed to see that as part of the claim. I -- I believe that, you know, in the years that we have seen this issue, both in -- in the legislature and at finance and in my various roles, local law enforcement has consistently said they had really good reasons for not testing sexual assault evidence. And a lot of those -- you know, they would give that classic example of identity not being the issue at hand.

And so I was very -- almost offended to read in there that they were saying that there's going to be a host of -- of investigative activities linked to this mandate because of -- of new evidence that was going to be gleaned from these rape kits that essentially had previously said was not going to happen and was not going to be useful.

And so I -- I would like the claimant to know that I -- I would really have preferred that they be here to kind of explain that, even if that's not a direction we're going because I wasn't sure what to make of that. And I appreciate your analysis and the staff analysis of all of this and -- and agree and am ready to move the staff recommendation whenever that's appropriate, Madam Chair.

Mr. Adams -- and then I do think -- I don't know
Ms. McGinnis, if you just want to speak to that in terms of
-- of Ms. Wong-Hernandez's question around new evidence and

1 if you have -- and certainly not yours to answer. But we'll 2 have Mr. Adams ask a question and then we'll come back to 3 you. 4 Mr. Adams. 5 MEMBER ADAMS: I'm certainly willing to defer it until 6 that question gets answer by Ms. McGinnis, and then I'll 7 ask. 8 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Thank you. 9 Ms. McGinnis, any thoughts on that? 10 What specifically is the MS. MCGINNIS: Yeah. 11 question, in terms of why the staff recommendation is to 12 exclude the investigative --13 MEMBER WONG-HERNANDEZ: No. My --14 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: No. I think there was 15 agreement -- oh, sorry. 16 MS. WONG-HERNANDEZ: My question was really for the 17 claimant. I agree with you in your assessment of it. But I 18 wanted to hear them articulate why they thought that was an 19 extension of the mandate, why there was uniquely new 20 evidence that they thought did not fall under their general 21 job description to investigate sexual assault. 22 Because, in the past, I feel like the -- the narrative 23 coming out of local law enforcement has been "We have good 24 reason for not testing the rape kits we don't test. We 25 don't think we're going to get new evidence out of them.

You know, it's not pertinent." They had a whole litany of reason. And you all site to the audit in your analysis from CSA from 2014, which sort of says "We don't doubt that they don't have these reason, but no one is actually documenting what they're testing." And I feel they're sort of talking out of both sides of their mouth, like -- not necessarily in this arena, but in the public policy discussion about this issue, that they did not think it was meaningful to test all of the kits, that they had reason for not. But then, in front of the Commission for State Mandates, arguing in their claim, it will produce a bunch of new evidence, and we will all do all of these new investigative activities.

And I am disappointed that the claimant isn't here to entertain question on their claim. I agree with your analysis, Ms. McGinnis, that it is not -- it's not mandated by these test claim statutes. So it really wasn't a question for you. What I was saying is that I wanted to make a statement because I'm not able to ask the claimants a question about why they really thought that flowed from this mandate and felt comfortable claiming that.

MS. MCGINNIS: And I could just add to that, just direct folks to the record if they would like to look at what's in the -- in the record there.

The -- my recollection was that the investigative activity was sort of generally asserted and there was

reference to a -- you know, Brady duty -- evidence -exculpatory evidence that they may have to produce if
there's an ongoing case. So potentially that may be a
basis, if they had a case where the identity of the
perpetrator was not in question, but maybe there was DNA
evidence that was obtained in that case, they may have some
outside -- outside the scope of the test claim duty to
produce that evidence. And that there would be activities
that the -- that the detective or the investigators would
have to perform in conjunction with that.

But I -- I believe, if you look at the documentation that was attached to the test claim, it was primarily in regards to their Brady duty. And then I think some general investigative duties to determine whether or not they may have to do further investigate.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Right. And I think that's to the -- to Ms. Wong-Hernandez's question. So I think -- all I was hoping, Ms. McGinnis, is perhaps we could ask the claimant then for -- to respond this question perhaps in writing since they didn't come today.

Would that be appropriate, Ms. Wong-Hernandez, or are you happy just to have your statement stand?

Looks like Ms. Halsey doesn't want that to happen.

MS. WONG-HERNANDEZ: I'm happy to have a statement saying that that's -

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

MS. WONG-HERNANDEZ: I'm very disappointed that that was part of this claim, and I'm glad that our staff has analyzed it to be, you know, within the -- the mandate and agree with the staff recommendation on that point.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Great. Thank you. I appreciate that.

Mr. Adams, do you want to follow up with question?

MEMBER ADAMS: Like Ms. Wong-Hernandez, I too am I

disappointed because I would have like to have a discussion

to hear the answers. I too agree with the staff

recommendation. And I would submit that, instead of running

up costs, this requirement makes cases easier to prosecute,

having this kind of information. It prevents the liability

of the potential of bad convictions, and certainly makes

plea bargains easier when you have this kind of information.

So that was going to be my pushback on the claimant alleging

increased cost. I was going to allege decreased cost. So

that's just my statement. And thank you. And I too will

support any motion made.

This request for parameters and guidelines amendment addresses Education Code section 422.38.24, which requires that the cost relating to the salaries and benefits of teachers incurred for all 13 state-required courses for high school graduation, including the second science course mandated in graduation requirements program shall be offset by specified state funding.

Staff finds that the funds identified in section 42238.24 for offsetting revenues that must be identified and deducted from the cost claimed, beginning October 29, 2010. As explain in the analysis, only after all of the funds have been expended exclusively for teacher's salaries and benefit costs for the state-required courses, may any additional remaining teacher's salaries and benefits costs be claimed for the mandated second science course.

All other requests made by the parties to further amend the parameters and guidelines are denied.

Accordingly, staff recommends that the Commission adopts the proposed decision and parameters and guidelines amendment to partially approve the request for parameters and guidelines amendment and authorize staff to make any technical, nonsubstantive changes to the proposed decision and parameters and guidelines amendment following the hearing.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Great. Thank you very much for that.

For the Department of Finance, Ms. Valdivia and Ms. Alexander, if you want to unmute yourselves please and state your names for the record.

This IRC challenges the State Controller's reduction to reimbursement claims file by the City of Bellflower for the municipal storm water and urban runoff water discharges program for fiscal years 2002/'3 into 2009/'10.

Claimant used local return funds from the Proposition C sales tax levied by the Los Angeles Metropolitan Transport Authority to fund the mandated activities but did not identify or deduct those funds from its reimbursement claims.

Staff finds that the claimant should have identified and deducted those funds from its claims because the Proposition C sale tax revenues are not claimants proceeds of taxes nor are they subject to claimant's appropriation limit. Thus the Controller's reduction is correct as a matter of law.

Staff recommends the Commission adopt the proposed decision to deny this IRC and authorize staff to make any technical, nonsubstantive changes to the proposed decision following the hearing.

     Bagley-Keene Open Meeting Act, Remote Participation in

     Meetings, which specifies that a meeting under the

     Bagley-Keene Open Meeting Act, includes a meeting held by
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teleconference. Among other things, the bill would require all meetings to be held by teleconference, authorize, but not require, state agencies to also provide an in-person venue, and would remove the provisions of the act that require each teleconference location to be identified in the notice and the agenda and be assessable to the public.

If included in the trailer bill and enacted, these requirements would take effect immediately, not later than October 1st, 2021, which is the last day for the Governor to sign or veto bills.

Next, is AB 1013, State Mandates Claims, which proposed to reduce the statutorily required someone minimum amount of costs incurred to file a mandate reimbursement claim from \$1,000 to \$900.

On March 4th, 2021, the bill was referred to the Assembly Committee on Local Government. This bill has not had a hearing and did not make it out of its house of origin before the deadline to do so for this session. It may become a two-year bill if it clears the Assembly by January 31st, 2022.

Finally is AB 885, Bagley-Keene Open Meeting Act,
Teleconferencing, which, among other things, proposed to add
provisions to the Bagley-Keene Open meeting act, requiring
that that portion of a meeting or proceeding conducted by
teleconference that is required to be open to the public be

both audibly and visually observable, the agenda be posted at the primary physical location where members of the public physically attend, and that at least on one of the members be present at that physical location for the meeting. On March 25th, 2021 the bill was rereferred to the Committee on Governmental Organization. This bill also has not had a hearing and did not make it out of its house of

origin before the deadline to do so for the session. It may 9 become a two-year bill if it clears the Assembly by January

10 31st, 2022.

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Staff will continue to monitor legislation for bills that impact the mandates process. And that all I have.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Thank you, Jill.

And we will keep you updated on the -- on the status of the Bagley-Keenes and open meetings and ability to continue to remotely going forward. There will be -- certainly as -as Ms. Magee pointed out, some options in that regard.

We do have one matter set for hearing in the County of San Diego Superior Court, and that's the challenge to the Commission's decision on the Youth Offender Parole Hearing Program. And that's all I have.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Great. Thank you.

Any questions for Ms. Shelton?

Seeing none, Ms. Halsey, will you present the Executive Director's Report, please.

MS. HALSEY: Absolutely. As you know, the Budget Act of 2021, AB 128, was timely enacted on June 28th, 2021. The Commission's budget was adopted as introduced. However, it is anticipated that budget trailer bill will make changes with respect to employee salaries, benefits, and related deductions, and the 5 percent general budget reduction for operating — operating expenses and equipment. And, so, we're still waiting to see how that develops.

And, administrative developments, I actually have a lot of news. First, I'm pleased to announce and so proud of our procurement team for receiving a notable achievement award during the 21st Annual State Agency Recognition Awards

Ceremony. The ceremony was to recognize state agencies whose exceptional work and dedication help accomplish the Governor's commitment to meet small business and disabled veteran business enterprise contracting goals for 2019/2020.

THE REPORTER: Ms. Halsey, would you slow down, please.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Ms. Halsey.

MS. PALCHIK: The court reporter is asking that you would just slow down a moment.

MS. HALSEY: Sure.

Congratulations to our procurement team on this achievement. Thank you to Jason Cranoti (phonetic) and Heidi for your continued commitment to excellence and to achieving and exceeding our goals to support small and DVBE businesses while choosing products that protect the health of our staff and environment. I'm proud to have such commit- -- committed professionals on our team. Sorry.

In addition, the Commission has recently renewed its lease and the office has been undergoing improvements, including flooring, molding, replacement of broken ceiling tiles, insulation, and a audio/video system for the conference room and upgraded internet cabling. And this has required staff to pack up the entire office, including all files, electronics and personal items, which staff have done in shifts over the course of two weeks. Construction work will be ongoing in the office until mid-August. At which time, staff will need to unpack the entire office and return things to their proper places. This has and will continue to take significant staff time and effort. However, when staff return to the office and are ready to welcome parties

-- interested parties and interested persons back, the office will be a great physical space in which to work and will be ideal for future trainings and smaller meetings.

And, finally, on the administrative front, I would like to welcome back Lorenzo Duran (phonetic), our long lost employee. Lorenzo volunteered and served on doing contact tracing with the County of LA for over a year on behalf of the Commission, and he did an exceptional job in that capacity. So much so that, by the end, he was in charge of a team of eight people in the contact tracing. So we're very proud of him and the work that he did there and also very, very happy to have him back.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Thank you, Ms. Halsey.

MS. HALSEY: Okay. Then, moving onto workload. For workload, after this hearing, on active status are 39 pending case -- test claims; 38 of which are regarding storm water permits, 2 active parameters and guidelines, add 3 state-wide cost estimates. On inactive status pending the outcome of litigation, there is 1 parameters and guidelines regarding storm water. And, finally, there are now 6 IRCs pending, including 1 new filing.

Commission staff currently expects to complete all currently pending test claims and IRCs by approximately the March 20, 2024, Commission meeting, depending on staffing and other workload. However, some of the test claims and

IRCs may be heard and decide early than currently indicated if they're consolidated for hearing.

Please check the tentative items on the Executive

Director Report to see if an item you're interested in is

coming up over the next couple of hearings. And that's all

I have.
