RE: Legislatively Determined Mandates

- Controlled substances: Overdose Reporting. (Senate Bill 67; Statutes 2023, Chapter 859)
- Coroners: Duties (Assembly Bill 1859; Statutes 2024, Chapter 684)

Dear Director Stephenshaw and Executive Director Gmur:

Rural County Representatives of California (RCRC), a statewide association of California's rural counties, hereby requests to initiate a Joint Request for Legislatively Determined Mandate (LDM) pursuant to Government Code section 17573 regarding the two above-captioned statutes. RCRC is informed and believes that the statute of limitations to file a test claim for each of these statutes has not yet expired for one or more of RCRC's member counties. Due to the similarity between these provisions, we suggest combined LDM discussions, but would be pleased to discuss each of these mandates individually if that is the Department's preference.

The Department's bill analyses for both bills, dated August 15, 2023 and July 11, 2024, respectively (attached), acknowledge that each statute "likely creates a state-reimbursable mandate," and we are looking forward to working with the Department to follow the process set forth in Section 17573 to develop a Joint Request for presentation to the Legislature.

By copy of this letter to the Commission on State Mandates, RCRC requests acknowledgement that the statute of limitations to file a test claim <u>for each of the above-captioned statutes</u> is tolled as of the date of this notice pursuant to Government Code section 17573, subdivision (b). While this matter is pending, RCRC or the Department shall notify the Commission of actions taken as set forth below, in accordance with subdivision (g) of Section 17573:

 Provide the Commission with a copy of any communications regarding development of a joint request under this section and a copy of a joint request when it is submitted to the Legislature. • Notify the Commission of the date of (A) the Legislature's action on a joint request in the Budget Act, or (B) the Department's decision not to submit a joint request.

BILL SUMMARY: Controlled substances: overdose reporting.

This bill requires coroners and medical examiners, no later than 72 hours after the examination of an individual, to report any death in which they determine that overdose, as defined, was a contributing factor to the Overdose Detection Mapping Application Program (ODMAP). The bill also specifies that information reported to the ODMAP by a coroner or medical examiner or shared with the ODMAP by the Emergency Medical Servies Authority shall not be used for a criminal investigation or prosecution and that individuals who in good faith make a report pursuant to the bill's provisions are immune from civil or criminal liability for this action.

FISCAL SUMMARY

The Department of Public Health and the Emergency Medical Services Authority indicate no fiscal impact associated with this bill.

The Department of Finance anticipates this bill likely creates a state-reimbursable mandate of approximately \$580,000 General Fund for county coroners and medical examiners to report overdose data to the ODMAP. This assumes an average cost of \$10,000 annually for 58 counties to meet the requirements of the bill. Although county coroners and medical examiners can charge fees for services, Finance anticipates it is unlikely that the cost of the bill's reporting requirements could be fully recovered through a fee.

COMMENTS

Finance is opposed to this bill because it likely creates a state-reimbursable mandate in the hundreds of thousands of dollars and may potentially be duplicative of existing efforts of the Department of Public Health's California Overdose Surveillance Dashboard, which provides data on state and local level drug-related overdose outcomes of California, including deaths.

This bill defines overdose as a condition, including extreme physical illness, decreased level of consciousness, respiratory depression, coma, or death, resulting from the consumption or use of any controlled dangerous substance that requires medical attention, assistance, or treatment, and clinical suspicion for drug overdose, including respiratory depression, unconsciousness, or altered mental state, without other conditions to explain the clinical condition.

A related bill, AB 1351 (Haney, 2023), requires coroners and medical examiners to report quarterly to the Department of Public Health the death of any individual that is involved, or was caused by, an overdose of drugs. AB 1351 was held in the Assembly Appropriations Committee.

DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE BILL ANALYSIS

BILL SUMMARY: Coroners: duties.

This bill requires a county coroner to test bodily fluids extracted in an autopsy for xylazine in cases where there is suspicion of an opioid overdose or when the individual was unresponsive to overdose intervention drugs and report positive results to the Department of Public Health (DPH) and the Overdose Detection Mapping Application Program (ODMAP). This bill also requires DPH to post the number of public results on the California Overdose Surveillance Dashboard website.

FISCAL SUMMARY

DPH estimates costs of \$690,000 General Fund for the first three years, and \$200,000 annually thereafter to modify and populate the ODMAP Dashboard.

The Department of Finance anticipates this bill likely creates a state-reimbursable mandate of approximately \$580,000 General Fund for county coroners to report the presence of xylazine in an autopsy to DPH and ODMAP. This assumes an average cost of \$10,000 annually for 58 counties to meet the requirements of the bill. Although county coroners can charge fees for services, Finance anticipates it is unlikely that the cost of the bill's reporting requirements could be fully recovered through a fee.

COMMENTS

The Department of Finance is opposed to this bill because it likely creates a state-reimbursable mandate in the hundreds of thousands of dollars and creates costs not included in the 2024 Budget.

Existing law requires county coroners to investigate deaths under specific circumstances and determine the cause, including those related to drugs. Existing law requires coroners and medical examiners to report any death in which they determine that overdose was a contributing factor to ODMAP.

This bill requires a county coroner to test bodily fluids extracted in an autopsy for xylazine in cases where there is suspicion of an opioid overdose or when the individual was unresponsive to overdose intervention drugs and report positive results to DPH and the ODMAP. This bill also requires DPH to post the number of public results on the California Overdose Surveillance Dashboard website.
