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RE: Legislatively Determined Mandate Incarceration: Pregnant Persons.

(Assembly Bill 2527; Statutes 2024, Chapter 722)

Dear Director Stephenshaw and Executive Director Gmur:

Rural County Representatives of California (RCRC), a statewide association of California's rural counties, hereby requests to initiate a Joint Request for Legislatively Determined Mandate (LDM) pursuant to Government Code section 17573 regarding the above-captioned statute. The Department's bill analysis dated July 26, 2024 (attached) acknowledges that this statute "may impose a reimbursable state mandate," and we are looking forward to working with the Department to follow the process set forth in Section 17573 to develop a Joint Request for presentation to the Legislature.

By copy of this letter to the Commission on State Mandates, RCRC requests acknowledgement that the statute of limitations to file a test claim is tolled as of the date of this notice pursuant to Government Code section 17573, subdivision (b). While this matter is pending, RCRC or the Department shall notify the Commission of actions taken as set forth below, in accordance with subdivision (g) of Section 17573:

- Provide the Commission with a copy of any communications regarding development of a joint request under this section and a copy of a joint request when it is submitted to the Legislature.
- Notify the Commission of the date of (A) the Legislature's action on a joint request in the Budget Act, or (B) the Department's decision not to submit a joint request.

BILL SUMMARY: Incarceration: pregnant persons.

This bill provides incarcerated pregnant persons with a minimum of 120 ounces of clean bottled water each day and daily meals that meet specified guidelines and prohibits placement of these individuals in solitary confinement or restrictive housing units during the pregnancy or for 12 weeks postpartum.

FISCAL SUMMARY

Although the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation (CDCR) indicates minor and absorbable costs associated with providing bottled water and nutritional meals to incarcerated pregnant individuals, it notes concerns with prohibiting the placement of incarcerated pregnant and postpartum persons in restricted housing. Restricted housing is utilized as a tool to protect both the immediate and long-term safety and security of the individual and population and prohibiting the utilization of this tool could present significant safety challenges. CDCR is still working through the policy impacts of the expanded scope of duties and notes that these additional duties could drive an increase in workload and therefore need for personnel.

Under certain circumstances, the California Constitution requires the state to reimburse local entities for the increased costs associated with a state-imposed program that requires local entities to implement a new program or provide a higher level of service. Finance notes this bill may impose a reimbursable state mandate as determined by the Commission on State Mandates by expanding the required items of access for incarcerated pregnant persons. The magnitude of the potential mandate costs is unknown but could be significant, given the requirement of additional food and water to incarcerated pregnant people.

COMMENTS

Notwithstanding the merits of this bill, Finance is opposed to it because the bill may create a state reimbursable mandate.

Existing law requires incarcerated pregnant persons to be provided access to both of the following:

- Prenatal vitamins, to be taken on a daily basis, in accordance with medical standards of care, and
- Newborn care that includes access to appropriate assessment, diagnosis, care, and treatment for infectious diseases that may be transmitted from a birthing person to the birthing person's infant.

COMMENTS (continued)

This bill expands these requirements to include:

- A minimum of 120 ounces of free, clean bottled water each day and
- Daily high-quality and high caloric nutritional meals that meet guidelines established by the Department of Public Health for the California Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children.

Existing law prohibits incarcerated pregnant persons from being tased, pepper sprayed, or exposed to other chemical weapons.

This bill prohibits incarcerated pregnant persons from being placed in solitary confinement or restrictive housing units during their pregnancy or for 12 weeks postpartum.

Existing law requires written notice of a denial, within 15 working days of the receipt of a request for:

- Access to the facility for community-based programs serving pregnant, birthing, or lactating incarcerated persons; or
- An elected support person to be present during labor, childbirth, and postpartum recovery.

This bill requires this written notice of denial to be provided to the pregnant person within two working days of receipt of the request.

According to the author's office, this bill improves conditions for incarcerated pregnant people and makes progress towards treating pregnant people with dignity and necessary prenatal care.
